
1. Organization:

- a. At the present time the 13th Bombardment Squadron (L) is one of the two squadrons composing the 3rd Bombardment Group (L). It's initial activation was on the 25 August 1917, at Kelly Field. Texas. The manner in which she received her complement were rather hap-hazard. The first one hundred and fifty (150) Airmen that were counted were designated the 104th Aero Squadron, having no regard for their rank or qualifications. She retained this designation until March of 1921 when she was re-designated the 13th Attack Squadron. On 20 June 1921 she was inactivated and remained in this status until 17 November 1929 when she was again activated and has remained active until present date.
- 2. Mission: In accordance with 3rd Bombardment Wing Letter, dated 14 October 1949, the mission of the 13th Bombardment Squadron (L) is as follows:
- a. To maintain this squadron in a state of Combat Readiness in accordance with USAF Training Standards 20-1, 9 December 1947.
- b. To be prepared to preform maximum low and medium altitude attacks, which specifically include bombing, skip bombing, strafing and rocket firing.
- c. To maintain in a state of readiness for execution of any emergency plans prescribed by this or higher Headquarters.
- d. Conduct Air Crew Training in accordance with Fifth Air Force regulation 51-20, 29 January 1949.
 - e. To be prepared to deploy this tactical Unit as directed.
- f. To conduct shipping Surviellance Flights as required by current directives.







- b. As fo the date of this report there are thirty one (31) pilots flying with this organization, four (4) of which
 are attahed. There are Nine (9) Bombardiers are Navigators
 flying with the Squadron. Of the thirty-one pilots, twenty-two
 (22) are combat ready and nine (9) are in training.
- 2. The squadron flew a total of Three hundred forty-six hours and thirty five minutes (346:35) for the month. All available pilots, with the exception of the new Officers in training, have completed their 60-2 Requirements for the month.
 - 3. Under the new break down on flying time the squadron is authorized to fly a maximum of 380:00 monthly.
 - lt. During the month the new Officers were flown every available period with an effort being made to fly every new pilot everyday. All new pilots are progressing satisfactorily and should recieve their check-out ride during the first part of Feb.
 - 5. The squadron had one near accident when one of the new pilots used to much brake on landing and blew one main tire.

Excellent control was maintained and the aircraft did not recieve further damage.

- 6. The squadron was temporarily relieved of the Misawa Tracking missions due to bad weather and snow and ice on the runways.
- 7. The Surviellance at Itasuke has been cut down to give maximum coverage with minimum aircraft time inline with the general curtailment of flying time.
- 8. Capt. F.E. Singleton was promoted during the month and received his Senior Pilot rating.
- 9. The squadron lost one Officer during the month. 1st Lt. V.H. Thomas completed his tour of duty and was returned to the Zone of Interior.







- 2. During the month a new Squadron policy was initiated for handling classified material. The undersigned Officer is charged with the responsibility of knowing the whereabouts of every classified document in the squadron. Therefore, an incoming classified log was started so as to know the disposition of each document. For instance, if an incoming document concerns personnel it is first logged in on the master log and further logged out to the Orderly Room. In this manner any document can be found in a matter of minutes if need be. Here-to-fore, the documents had been taken directly to the section concerned and receipted for there.
- 3. On 12 January 1950, 314th Air Division, via telephone to 3rd Bomb Group Operations, temporarily cancelled our Early Warning Tracking Missions at Misawa Air Base. This can be easily recognizable, for the inclement weather, adverse operation and working conditions caused by snow and ice seriously hamper any operation from that Field for weeks at a time during the Winter months.
- 4. Also during the month of January, the Intelligence Section submitted to the Commanding Officer, a request for a Quonset to be erected between the Operations Building and the Armament Quonset. The purpose of this Quonset will be to maintain an adequate up-to-date War Room for the Officers and Airmen which is impossible to do under present working conditions. It is felt that this would be of great benefit to the men of this unit. By helping them to abreast of current world trends and the local Intelligence situations, it would undoubtly make them more cognizant


of their duties in the Air Force and here in the Far East.


- 5. New projects for the month of January was the procurment of two new cabinets which were promptly put into use as storage cabinets.

- b. As of the date of this report there are twenty-nine (29) pilots flying with this organization, four (1) of which are attached. There are nine (9) Bombardiers and Navigators flying with the Squadron. Of the twenty-nine pilots, twenty (20) are combat ready and nine (9) are in training.
- 2. The squadron flew a total of three hundred ninety-three hours and forty-five minutes (393:45) for the month, and all completed their 50-2 training requirements with the exception fo eleven (11).
- 3. The monthly allocation of three hundred eighty hours and fifteen minutes (380:15) per squadron has made close shheduling necessary. By the time the newly assigned Officers have completed their training requirements and other flying committments are filled, there is not enough time remaining to get practice of the Bombing and Gunnery Range.
- 4. The training of the new pilots continued during the month and all but one (1) checked out.
- 5. One near accident occured when a nose gear actuating cylinder seal blew causing loss of braking action. The acft was stopped however with no damage to the acft.
- 6. The Surveillance requirements at Itazuki have been reduced to utilization of two (2) acft instead of three (3) which will be

of help in saving of flyinf time.

- 7. An unfortumate accident accurred on the 14 February 1950 wherein one of our Surviellance crews, inroute to Itazuke crashed on the island of Shikoku during bad weather. The pilot, Capt. R F Price, along with S/Sgts James S Cacile and Royale R Newman were lost to the Squadron. An extensive maximum effort search was canducted by all flying units of the Islands.
- 8. The Squadron lost one Officer, Lt. A D Rivadal, to Radar School during the month.
- 9. A Successful FEAF Test Mission was conducted during the month in which the 3rd Bomb Group was under the Operational Control of the 20th Air Force.
- 10. A wire was recieved during the month in which the Navy Commended the Squadron and Group on the fine cooperation given during the execution of a Navy Intruder Mission.
- 11. All other operational activities were conducted on a normal basis, during the month. However, the 28 February found the Squadron prepared for a General Staff Inspection conducted by General E E Partridge, Commanding General of Fifth Air Force, on the afternoon of the 28 February 1950.





- 5. Squadron Order #5, dated 13 February 1950, appointed the undersigned Custodian of Chassified Document File.



- 1. In compliance with 3rd Bomb Wing Regulation 210-1, dated 1 April 1950, the Historical Summary of Events for the month of April is hereby submitted:

- 2. As of the date of this report there are 27 pilots flying with the organization, 4 of whom are attached. There are 5 bombardiers and 2 navigators assigned. Of the 27 pilots, 18 are combat ready while the remaining 9 are in training.
- 3. The squadron flew a total of approximately 350 hours for the month, most of which was devoted to group missions, surveillance, and practice bombing, rocket and gunnery missions. Buring the month 7 pilots completed their 60-2 requirements. This left a total of 17 pilots who have not completed their requirements. It is anticipated that by the end of May all of the pilots will have completed these requirements.
- 4. The squadron has been attempting to bring the bombardiers up to the standard required by the Air Force. The 5 bombardiers assigned have dropped a toal of 90 bombs. 1st Lt. James M. Neale, 621st ACW Squadron, Niigata Air Base dropped 20 bombs to complete his bombing requirements for the year.
- 5. There has been some difficulty encountered in our bombing for record. The 35th Fighter Wing has taken over the Mito Bombing Range for the month of May and the first part of June and without a ground target the bombardiers are unable to score their bombs as required by regulations.

- Cameras have been installed in the aircraft so that photographs can be taken of the bomb drop on Onahara-Shima, but this is unsatisfactory due to the fact that no definite target is available, and the bombs are unusually hard to spot when they are dropped among the whitecaps on the water.
- 6. Surveillance missions at Itazuke have encountered no difficulty A number of sightings have been made, and the surveillance pilots report that the activity of Russian ships has increased from previous missions. These missions are considered by the pilots as an interesting sidelight in the present world situation. The efficiency of the pilots and observers has increased considerably due to this interest and the excellent briefings given by Lt. Robiczek of the Fifth Air Force Surveillance Intelligence Center.
- 7. The squadron participated in 5 joint Army-Air Force missions at the Fuji-Susano Manuever Area with elements of the 25th Infantry Division. The first two missions were considered successful. The third mission was unsuccessful due to a lack of radio contact and inadequate information furnished the squadron. The briefing information received differed radically from the actual problem that was set up, and without radio contact there was no way for the pilots to determine what was wanted by the ground forces. Prior to the fourth mission the difficulties were straightened out, and this mission was considered verysuccessful. The ground controller was excellent. The fifth mission was unsuccessful due to bad weather over the target area.
- 8. The joint Army-Air Force missions have given the organization some idea of the problems involved in ground support. They have also pointed out the need for close ecoperation between the ground control and the flying organization. It was brought forcibly home that without proper briefing information the air crews cannot successfully complete their and of the mission. In order to get the maximum benefit from this type of mission it is felt that both parties should be well aware of the problems to be encountered.
- 9. On the 24th of April three aircraft from the squadron flown by Major A.E. Shook, 1st Lt. Dobdell Jr., and 1st Lt. R.J. Revel completed a service test on the B26 type aircraft to determine the maximum range of the ship with a normal bomb load and external wing tanks installed. 2500 pounds of bombs were loaded internally, and a gas load of 1335 gallons was added. Somewhat like the paradox of the bumblebee that is not supposed to be able to fly these airplanes got off the ground with 1500 pounds more that the recommended load, While the 8th Bomb Squadron took off with 3500 pounds more than the recommended load. All 6 ships flew a 9 hour course from Johnson Air Base down the northwest side of Honshu to Gotto Retto Chain. The course was then supposed to go to a bombing range off of Fukue Shima. However, bad weather and rain made a bombing run impossible. After turning around the ships flew up the

Northwest side of Honshu to Wakasa-Wan, and then across to Nagoya and up the South side of Honshu. Permission was received to drop the bombs on the Mito Water Range, and the flights proceeded to this range. The bombs were dropped, and all aircraft headed on course for Johnson Air Base. Both flights flew in the local area until they had approximately 5% of their total gas load still remaining. The 13th Squadron ships landed after 9 hours and 35 minutes of flying time while the 8th Squadron ships landed after an additional 5 minutes. All ships landed with enough fuel to fly another hour. The total range of the mission was over 1800 nautical miles.


- 10. Another group mission was flown on the 27th of April involving 9 aircraft from the squadron. The mission was a simulated low level mission against supply dumps at the Keizume Air Base approximately 25 nautical miles North of Johnson Air Base. The route was a circuitous route to make the mission last longer. This squadron had one aircraft abort, but replaced it with a spare. The mission was not satisfactory but it did point out that the squadron needs many more missions of this type.
- 11. Additional flying training has been accomplished in checking out 6 of the new pilots in skip bombing, rocket firing, and gunnery. The mito Bombing Range was utilized on every available day. It was the first time in approximately four months that any pilot had done any firing.
- 12. Two skip bombing missions were flown on the mito Bombing Range on the 10th and 12th of April to test an anti-ricochet device on 250 pound bombs. Aircraft were assigned altitudes from 50 feet to 300 feet and airspeeds varying from 250 miles per hour to 350 miles per hour. The results of the test have not been released as yet.
- 13. The shortage of navigators and observers to take a tour of temporary duty at Itazuke every other week has been alleviated by the assignment of two new officers, Capt Colin J. Fraser a navigator, and 2nd Lt Rollie M. Bishop a bombardier.

1. In compliance with 3rd Bomb Wing Regulation 210-1, dated 1 April 1950, the Historical Summary of Events for the month of April 1950 is submitted:

- 2. The Surveillance crews were especially successful during the month in taking photographs of shipping in the International Shipping Lane off the coasts of Korea and Northern Kyushu. Several excellent photos of Russian vessels were returned to the squadron to add to the ever increasing collection of surface vessel photographs. Added to the collection also, with much speculation and comment, was the photo of a Russian Submarine which was taken by Surveillance crews of the 8th Bombardment Squadron (L). The vessel was found surfaced Northeast of Fukucka, Japan in the International Shipping Lane. The vessel had a long single line of ports along each side of the hull. It had one (1) gun on deck mounted forward of the superstructure. The superstructure had the number G-53 painted on each side. The submarine raised no flag but was found to be of Russian origin by Fifth Air Force Surveillance and Intelligence Center (FAF SIC).
- 3. Renovation of the Operations building was begun during the month and is near completion at the present time. The Intelligence Section was allocated a space 10° by 12° which will be a combination office and War Room. The section anticipates the inaugaration of two (2) hours weekly of mandatory War Room reading by the Officers. Now that the section will have a security proof office, much of the classified information which has heretofore been impossible to put out for the men can now be made available.
- 4. The section was engaged the latter part of the month in the Administering of Air Force Form 184, a fifty (50) question test on


Safeguarding Military Information, to the Officers and airmen who are authorized to handle Classified material. This was done in compliance with Fifth Air Force Letter 205-225. Due to the shortage of these tests only twelve (12) tests have been given with forty (40) remaining to be given when the forms are made available.

- 5. In accordance with Fifth Air Force Regulation 50-10, the officers and airmen were given three (3) hours of Intelligence Training during the month. Two (2) thirty (30) minute periods on Intelligence highlites were given to the officers by Captain W.H. Russell, Group Intelligence Squadron. 

- 3. The Section has a T.O. strength of 86 airmen and 88 presently assigned. All airmen in the section met a classification board and have been given new specialty numbers.
- 4. The section is becoming accustomed to its new surroundings and is in the process of getting firmly established in our new home. A new project of cleaning and painting all equipment has been started and many work orders have been submitted to better utilize the space available to us and to make working conditions as comfortable as possible for the men.
- 5. An inspection by the Wing Air Inspector is in progress at the present time. Col. Coddington, our Wing Commander also conducted a line inspection during the month of April.
- 6. A two dock inspection system was inauguarated in the hanger in order to more fully utilized the new men assigned and bring their maintenance abilities under the supervision of the older and more experienced men. Ten major inspections were completed during the month, three (3) 100 hour and seven (7) 50 hour inspections.
- 7. One more B26 type aircraft, #44-34234, was added to our squadron during the month bringing us back up to our authorization of 16. This aircraft is the replacement for #44-34389, which crashed during the month of February. It was given an acceptance check and is presently in commission.
- 8. The 3rd Bomb Group Headquarters, issued an order that during the weekend period only four aircraft will be allowed on the ramp. The remaining aircraft must be dispersed to the outlying quadrants of the field area. B26 #44-34377 was taxied out to the dispersal point on the practice run and suffered prop damage when the aircraft's nose wheel sank in the soft ground. Succeeding dispersal operations have been carried out successfully.





9. A maximum range mission was flown on 22 April by three B26 type aircraft of the 13th Bomb Squadron. External wing tanks were installed on #44-34372, #44-34297 and #44-34478 and the aircraft were airborne nine hours and thirty five minutes. No maintencance difficulties were encountered during the flight, however, subsequent operations of #44-34372 disclosed that spark plugs on both engines had been fouled during the flight and had to be changed.


10. A new maintenance problem has arisen in the squadron that promises to be a difficult one to solve. Eight (8) of the sixteen (16) aircraft essigned have between 1840 and 1955 hours on the airframes. With normal flying the section will be required to pull six (6) 1,000 hour inspections in the next three months and two (2) more during the fourth month. These thousand hour inspections coupled with the normal maintenance requirements will add up to a terrific workload on the section.

11. The drive to clean up outstanding Technical Orders continued with the accomplishment of ten during the month. Thirty four (34) Tots remain to be complied with.







- 2. The month of April began rather quietly. Routine inspections and daily maintenance duties were completed as scheduled. The Memorandum Receipt property charged to the Armament Section was inventoried and a current list of the shortages was submitted to the Commanding Officer. Efforts were made to store the property as well as the present facilities permit. The Section is still concerned with the stand-by alert, although a Group policy has not yet been put into effect governing the procedure to follow at Squadron level. The month of April, at the outset, resembled the previous three months during which little in the way of mission preparation or expenditures of bombs, rockets and ammunition was accomplished.
- 3. 1st Lt. Lyons and S Sgt Rittenhouse were called upon to lecture the recently arrived 2nd Lts. on the .50 cal., machine gum, its structure, capabilities and potentialities. A lengthy dissertation on the technique and purpose of strafing rounded out the Sections contribution to their ground training.
- 4. The Section was becoming accustomed once again to routine activity when, on the 7th of April, a mission which had been in the field of anticipation earlier in the month was confirmed. The Squadron was to take part in the further testing of a 250 pound General Purpose bomb, equipped with an anti-ricochet device. Four (4) aircraft were loaded, each with two (2) 250 pounds GP's with the anti-ricochet device, full ammunition in each of the guns in the upper turret, full ammunition load for the fixed gums, capacity 2.25 SCAR's, 500 rounds of .50 cal., and six (6) 100 pound blue blivet practice bombs. The results of the mission


were recorded by Group and the inactivity of both equipment and men had shown itself in the overall expenditures. A few of the malfunctions were; weak accelerator springs, link james, ejection jams, broken or leaky compressor lines and defective firing pins. Pilots failed to recharge the guns which also accounted in part for minimum expenditures. Results of the missions for the month are listed chronologically below.



- b. Total expenditures; 38,495 rds .50 cal., ammo, 190 one hundred practice bomos, 15 one hundred pound General Purpose bombs, 24 two hundred and fifty pound General Purpose bombs, 6 1,000 pound General Purpose bombs and 160 succalibre aerial rockets.
- 5. In addition to the above listed expenditures the following work of note was accomplished; one (1) 500 inspection, three (3) 100 hour inspections, five (5) 50 hour inspections, together with an acceptance check and a one hundred (100) hour inspection on aircraft #44-344234. Seven sets of guns were pulled, cleaned and re-installed, and 44,650 rounds of .50 cal., ammunition were belted. The blank Form 185's were received and work was begun on the complete historical information on the guns we have installed in the aircraft.
- 6. The Section is looking forward with hopeful anticipation to the month of May, the end of which should find the Armament Shop quite an installation with the promised building of the new shop confirmed.

i. This organization was scheduled for field maneuvers at Matsushima Airdrome, APO 7, Unit 6 for the period from 18 June 1950 to 17 July 1950. This maneuver was directed by Training Order 6-50, Hq., 5th Air Force, June 1950. The advance echelon departed Johnson Air Base on 16 July 1950 for the purpose of readying the site for the arrival of the squadron. Preparation for the maneuvers was started approximately thirty (30) days in advance of the actual departure date. Lt Harrison Lobdell was appointed Project Officer and accomplished his mission in a superior manner. Numerous confrences were held with the Wing Staff and supporting elements and on the date of departure all points had been covered and complete agreement reached regarding the maneuvers. For the purpose of support five (5) officers and one hundred and twenty six (126) airmen were placed on BS with the squadron. All personnel were attached from 3d M & S Gp, 3d Air Base Gp and 3d Medical Gp. The Advance Echelon Commander was Capt John Gassler, this organization. The Ground Echelon, commanded by Maj Fred F. Bronson, departed Johnson Air Base via rail on 18 June 1950 and arrived at Matsushima the following morning. The Air Echelon consisting of all aircraft, combat crews, operations personnel and a few maintenance personnel were scheduled to arrive at a later date after participating in a FEAF test to be staged out of Ashiya Air Base, APO 75, and an aerial review for Secretary of Defense Johnson. The personnel at Matsushima had as their mission the assignment of unloading supplies and equipment and the setting up of the maneuver camp. Four trains in all were utilized in the transporting of personnel, supplies and equipment and a great deal of time was spent unloading these trains and setting up the equipment for operation. Permanent housing facilities at Matsushima were utilized until 22 June 1950 when the tent area was complete. The one night that was spent in tents saw a record downfall of rain and the entire camp area was completely flooded. The water was standing from two (2) to twelve (12) inches in all tents. The Maneuver Commander, Major Fred F. Bronsen, ordered all personnel back into permanent billets for reasons of health and sanitation. Following the move from the tents normal operations were effected and usual organizational duties were resumed. Full copperation was received from Army Personnel at the Air Transportability Training Center and they did everything possible to assist us in anything we requested. The messing facilities of the Training Center were utilized, with augmentation of personnel and equipment from the Maneuver Detachment, and were found to be very (B) HESTRICTED satisfactory.

In all four (4) organizational aircraft arrived at Matsushima but all were cut of commission on arrival due to major inspections. Maintenance personnel assumed the task of completing the inspections and all other operations were normal. On 27 June 1950 word was recedived from Johnson to ready all aircraft for flight immediately and have them return to Johnson AB. All T/O&E equipment was to be packed immediately and loaded on a special train to return to Johnson. All organization personnel were also to depart for Johnson on the train mentioned above. A C-54 type aircraft was dispatched to Matsushima to air lift all combat crew, critical maintenance, armament and operations personnel direct to Ashiya Air Base. A C-46 was dispatched from Matsushima to air lift other maintenance personnel to Johnson Air Base. Personnel of the 3d Maneuver Detachment worked all night of 27 June 1950 loading the train and all personnel and equipment of this organization departed Matsushima 0600 hours 28 June 1950. Upon arrival at Johnson at 2330 hours 28 June 1950 personnel of the organization were briefed as to the intervational situation and instructed to stay in their quarters for further instructions. On 29 June 1950 by rail from Tokyo to Ashiya AB thirty one (31) enlisted men departed. Remaining personnel were scheduled for airlift the same day. This words our maneuvers and our stay at Johnson AB. The remainder of the month was spent in travel from Johnson AB to Ashiya AB.





For the most part, the intensive training and initial introduction to the aircraft was most beneficial, the newly assigned Officers did creditable work.
- 7. The missions of a special nature delegated to the Squadron were tactical support ans application at Fuji Sussanno Maneuver Area and surveillance at Itazuke. Concerning the missions to Fuji Sussanno, a flight of three B-26's worked in direct coordination with a ground controller in support of Infantry. 

Flying time for the most part was consumed in getting the 2nd Lts compat ready. Night proficiency was stressed. Early in the month night cross countries were numerous. A final effort, though not entirely necessary, was made to complete 60-2 Requirements. The personnel attached to the Squadron for flying were the last to accomplish their 60-2 Requirements. Misstons to the bombing and gunnary ranges were also flown in order to further qualify the personnel in the Squadron.
- 3. The Operations Section followed closely the original plan for the movement to the Maneuver Area. Measurements of the items to be carried were taken and the crates were constructed. Preparations were completed on the 16th and flights were set up for the transport of the Air Echelon to Matsushima. Capt. Gasaler was in charge of the advanced echelon, which entrained on 16 Jun 50 and arrived at Matsushima on 17 Jun 50. The train was unloaded adn the area prepared for the arrival of the Air Echelon. Four (4) aircraft were flown to the maneuwer site. The remaining aircraft stayed at Johnson Air Base until 21 Jun when they departed to Ashiya to participate in a FEAF test of Okinawa Air defense. Due to inclement weather the mission was cancelled. On 24 Jun 3 Aircraft were dispatched to Matsushima. The remainder following as far as Johnson Air Base on the 25 June 1950.
- 4. On 27 Jun 50 the Operations Section at Matsushima was notified to return all available aircraft to Johnson for further dispatch to Ashiya Air Base in order to assist in quelling a dispute between the



North and South Koreans. All aircraft with the exception of aircraft #44 35580 were flown to Ashiya on the 27th of June 1950. Aircraft #44 35580 was given test hop at 0800 28 Jun and immediately after took off for Ashiya wia Johnson Air Base. The 14 aircraft were flown out with a full crew component, the only representatives of the Squadron until the ground echelon arrived on the 1st day of July 1950.

- 5. On 28 June the first mission was airborne at 07:30 for its combat indoctrination. Two flights of six (6) each took off and a rude indoctrination ensued. Fully loaded with 100# GP, 5" HWAR and 50 cal ammuniton. The first 12 sorties were flown at low lewel. Small arms ground fire accounted for the the maximum damage to aircraft, weather for the personnel losses. Aircraft # 44 34478 crashed on return to Ashiya. The aircraft was piloted by 1st Lt Harding with S/Sgt Goodwin as Aerial Gunner was last seen in a tight low turn to final and shortly thereafter crashed into the water off the North end of the runway. Aircraft #44 344301 piloted by 1st Lt Morrow with S/Sgt Bankus as aerial gunner was damaged beyoned economical repair in a straffing attack. However, the crew and aircraft returned to Ashiya Air Base safely although extremely adverse weather conditions existed. Aircraft #44 34301 further served in the capacity of a service stock, replacement parts were urgently needed and were taken from aircraft #44 34301. Aircraft # 44 34379 piloted by 1st Lt Ballew with Capt. Bittman as Nav. and S/Sgt Halcomb as gunner made a series of skip bombing and strafing passes at an invading Regiment traveling via rail Southeast into Seoul. Lt Ballew lost his right engine, feathered and began losing power on the left engine, managed to land safely at Suwon. The aircraft was strafed later that evening by Yak 9's. Thus the 13th Bombardment Squadron had completed its first full day of combat operation and wound up with the following score: 12 sircraft dispacthed and returned safely but required extreme amount of sheet metal work. Three (3) aircraft and one (1) crew completely lost to the organization. One 29 June 1950 one of the most formidable and truly successful raids to date was flown at medium altitude. The Squadron supplied eight (8) aircraft out of a remaining 12, we had received one (1) replacement, and with the 8th Bomb Squadron crossed the 38th Parrell to Pyongyang and destroyed parked and hangered aircraft, repair shops and runway located Northeast of the town at the Airdrome. The bomb pattern later verified by the photos taken on the mission indicated a maximum destruction to all facilities located on the Air field. This was truely a raid to be well pround of for in one days activity the enemy air opposition had been neutralized.
- 6. On 30 June 9 of the 12 remaining aircraft went roaring once again down the valleys in search of any North Koreen military traffic moving toward the front. The missions conducted on the local gurnery and rocket ranges proved well worth the while.
- 7. Each and every individual in a tactical capacity did the 13th Bomb Squadron and himself undeniably prouds.

- 1. In accordance with 3d Bombardment Wing Regulation 210-3, dated 1 April 1950, the following Summary of Events for the Intelligence section for the months of May and June is hereby submitted:
 - a. Key personnel are as follows:

1st Lt Monte Ballew Jr 2d Lt John P. Braddy Intelligence Officer
Asst Intelligence Officer

- 2. Renovation of the Operations building was begun in April and again found the Intelligence section without a place to work at the beginning of May. The section was allocated a space 10' x 12' and it will be utilized as a combination office and War Room. The section has already received the OK from the squadron CO to inagurate a two hour mandatory war room reading per officer per week and it is believed that this will improve the overall outlook on the world situation and impress the aircrews on their strategic location here in the Far East.
- 3. On 8 May 1950 the Annual General Inspection was begun and found the section in perfect shape awaiting inspection. All classified material was relogged and a new system of logging in out was begun. The operations was given a safe filing cabinet and all classified that pertained to that section was turned over to them. This also was inagurated in the communications and armament and helped to alleviate the space that was being utilized by these sections in the Intelligence field safe.
- 4. During the month of April the section had begun to administer to personnel authorized to handle classified material a fifty (50) question test on "Safeguarding Military Information". At the beginning of the month the section had given twelve (12) of these to key personnel and has yet to give forty (40). It is anticipated that these forms (AF 184) will be made available to the section in the near future and the administering of these tests can be completed. This is being done in compliance with FAF Letter 205-225.
- 5. Surveillance at Itazuke was carried out as usual and as in previous months the crews returned numerous photos of surface vessels. These were added to our collection of surface vessels and aided the crews in their surface recognition.

- 6. In compliance with 3d Bomb Wing Regulation 200-3, dated 20 February 1950, the Intelligence training for the month of May was as follows; On 4 May 1950 a United States Air Force Intelligence lecture was given by Capt William H. Russel, Group Intelligence Officer. Eighty (80) percent of the squadron officers attended.
- 7. During the month of June the squadron had three (3) lectures on Intelligence. These lectures and those given in May were in compliance with FAF Regulation 50-10. The first lecture was given on 3 June and was a film on Air Power. These films were narrated by Lowell Thomas and was produced and indorsed by the Department of the Air Force. This was an excellent film on the potentials of the Air Force and was greatly appreciated by all the officers and airmen attending. Ninety (90) percent of the airmen and seventy-four (74) officers attended. Two more lectures were given during the month and they were given by Capt Russel. These were given on classified material received from Department of the Air Force and were presented in an excellent manner. The first lecture was given on 8 June with eighty-three (83) percent of the officers attending. The second was given on 15 June with seventy-five (75) percent of the officers attending.
- 8. During the months of May and June much pre-planning and speculation went into the preparation of the squadrons impending maneuvers. This section was charged with the responsibility of security and interior guards for the bivousc area. The proposed camp site was reconncitered and a sufficient number of guards was decided upon to secure the camp site. The section was also burdened with the safe-guarding of "FEAF Target Folder" which were compelled to take with us due to the anticipated control of Fifth Air Force during the last two weeks of the maneuver. An Intelligence specialist was loaned the section by the Group Intelligence section and it was proposed that he would sleep in the room or tent that these folders were to be kept.
- 9. It Braddy was relieved from duty in the Intelligence section and was reassigned to Operations. This was due to long range planning by the squadron CO in an attempt to have a limited amount of qualified personnel in the operations section due to impending rotation of all the old officers in the late fall. It is felt that Lt Braddy will like operations work better than Intelligence inasmuch that he is better qualified for that type of work.
- 10. 13TH BOMBARDMENT SQUADRON AT WAR. On 27 June 1950 category III was declared and the squadron was deployed to Ashiya Air Base. All squadron target folders and Intelligent field kits were turned over to Group S-2. The first combat mission was flown on the 28 June 1950 and comsisted of six (6) aircraft from the squadron and three (3) from the 8th Bomb Squadron. The first mission was a low level attack against targets of opportunity north of Secul, Korea. The squadron inflicted the maximum amount of damage.

11. Aside from the aforementioned the section ran smoothly and encountered no serious difficulties.

- 3. The section has T/O strength of eighty-six (86) airmen with eighty-four (84) assigned. All airmen who did not meet a classification board in April met one in June and have been given new specialty numbers.
- 4. The first two weeks of May were spent performing normal duty functions and preparing the section for the semi-annual 5th Air Force Inspection. The offices were cleaned and painted. Crew chief desks were constructed and an office made for the Line Chief. One week and the entire section was used to dig driveway and sidewalk lanes around the hangar. The hangar area has improved considerably with the new sidewalks, the white washed hangar foundation, and the rocks along the road and driveway. The section was inspected on 10 May by the 5th Air Force Inspectors with very few discrepancies noted.
- 5. After the 5th Air Force Inspection the section started preparation for a thirty (30) day field maneuver at Matsushima scheduled to begin in the middle of June. A big effort was made to gather up the loose ends and have everything ready to go when the squadron moved out. An eight (8) man detail from the section was on the advanced party which left for Matsushima on 15 June to set up sleeping and messing facilities. The main body left Johnson on 18 June and arrived at Matsushima on 19 June.
- 6. Four (4) aircraft 44-34287, 372, 478 and 44-35580 were flown to the maneuver site. The remaining ten (10) aircraft and maintenance crews to man them remained at Johnson Field until 21 June. On that date the aircraft and crews departed for Ashiya to participate in a FEAF test of Okinawa air defenses. Due to inclement weather the missions to Okinawa were not flown and the aircraft were returned to Johnson Air Base on 25 June 1950.
- 7. During the squadron short stay at the maneuver site operations were greatly hampered by inclement weather. The rain was so heavy that the tent area was abandoned and all personnel moved into barracks on the base. Hundred hour inspections were accomplished on 44-34287, 372 and 44-35580 and a fifty hour inspection on 44-34478.
- 8. On 27 June orders were received that all available aircraft would be returned to Ashiya Air Base to participate with United Nations Forces in action against North Korea. Thirteen (13) of the squadrons fourteen (14) aircraft were flown to Ashiya on 27 June. Work on 44-35580 was completed at 0500 hours on 28 June and the aircraft was immediately flown from Matsushima to Johnson to Ashiya.

- 9. One (1) engineer accompanied each plane to Ashiya and eight (8) more were airlifted from Matsushima to Ashiya on 27 June. The remainder of the section departed by rail from Matsushima on 27 June and arrived at Johnson Air Base on 28 June. On 29 June the ground echelon departed from Johnson by rail and arrived at Ashiya on 1 July.
- 10. The squadron conducted its first combat operations on 28 June. All sorties were low level, and we lost three (3) aircraft during the day. 44-34478 crashed off the end of the runway at Ashiya attempting to land under adverse weather conditions. 44-34379 was shot up south of Secul and made a single engine landing at Suwon. The field was strafed by YAK fighters and the aircraft was destroyed. 44-34301 returned to the base but had received such extensive damage that it was beyond economical repair and was salvaged. All serviceable parts from 301 were removed and proved invaluable in keeping our other aircraft flying. Almost all of our aircraft received some battle damage during the day, but with the exception of 44-34287 were back in the air the next morning. 287 had a hydraulic line shot out and also required several hours of sheet metal work.
- 11. No aircraft were lost on 29 and 30 June, but small arms fire continued to cause damage and the sheet metal men were working around the clock to patch up the holes.
- 12. During these first days of operations aircraft supplies of all kind were critically short but by 30 June Service Stock had arrived and things were looking up.
- 13. On 30 June we received our first replacementaircraft, 44-343375. It came from 5th Air Force Headquarters and was a welcome addition to our thinning ranks. The end of the month found us with twelve (12) aircraft assigned.





Pfc William C. Dawson, AFSN 64131, was assigned to the section as assistant personal equipment technician.


