

SECTION II

MAJOR ACTIVITIES

1. DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST, 1948, the 90th Bombardment Squadron (L) accomplished more toward its primary mission of maintaining combat readiness than in probably any month since the end of the last war. Though this statement is the personal opinion of this historical officer, the facts and figures regarding the training of combat crews in the Squadron during the first three weeks of the month will show that there is a substantial basis for the statement.

Instead of the emphasis being placed on the quantity of expenditures in such items as practice bombs, rockets, cal. 50 ammunition, etc, more attention was devoted by operations toward giving more pilots and gunners the minimum monthly training set up by higher headquarters as necessary for maintaining proficiency. Fullest utilization was made of both the Mito and Onohara Shima gunnery and Bombing ranges, and the maximum number of pilots and gunners possible were scheduled for missions to one or the other of them. Concentration was mostly on minimum altitude bombing with not only the 100 lb practice bomb, buy also with 500 and 100 lb general purpose demolition bombs with M 112 and M 113 tail fuses:

Also, emphasis was placed on strafing, tow-target and splash turret gunnery, as well as rocket firing with the 2.25" practice HVAR.

As previously mentioned, all of the above type training was accomplished in the first 2 1/2 weeks of the month, at which time operations had to slow down the effort along those particular lines in order to concentrate on such basic minimum requirements as instrument and night flying for the month.

It was just about this time (the third week in the month) that a red cross T.O. Ol-40AJ-122 started affecting the status of our B-26's. The T.O. concerns the inspection of the nose wheel oleo strut for cracks in the base of the strut itself. It requires the immediate grounding of the aircraft until the strut can either be replaced or the satisfactory repair by welding is accomplished. It is believed that the subject crack in the strut is prevalent in a majority of the B-26 type aircraft thoughout the entire Air Forces, so this squadron and group is not the only unit affected by the T.O.. It is also believed that a lack of replacement struts in supply stacks as well as inadequate equipment (or possibly personnel) to accomplish repair by welding will keep the concerned aircraft grounded for some time to come. At any rate, by the and of August the 90th Bomb Squadron had 12 B-26 aircraft grounded by the T.O., with the possibility of the other 4 being found in the same condition upon major inspections in the near future.

2. OF PERHAPS MORE IMPORTANCE than the engineering T.O., but with less drastic effects on the operation of the squadron, was the accouncement by the Base Commanding Officer on the 16th of the month that the base would go immediately into operation under what was called the "Wing-Base" setup. the 3rd Bomb Group, being the major tactical organization at

Yokota AFB immediately became the 3rd Bombardment Wing. The only farreaching effects on our squadron was the necessity for handling personel, and affiliated activities, on the squadron level. Also PLM was
to have been done away with, and all maintenance..lst and 2nd echelon
....was to have been accomplished with in the squadron..However, it was
deceided that PLM would continue in operation until the squadron could
get set up to handle the necessary maintenance.

There was also somewhat of a personnel shuffle along with organizational change that was reported in the personnel section of this history.


Hand in hand with the organizational change was the announcement that the 3rd Bombardment Group under the 3rd Bombardment Wing would operate under a new T.O.& E. #1-1123, the old T.O.& E. 1-137R, being rescinded as far as our using it is concerned.

It is believed that the change-over will, of necessity, be a gradual one, and will not actually be complete (this is strictly an opinion) until a new type aircraft is assigned....if such is anticipated.


3. AN HONOR OF WHICH THE 90TH IS PROUD is in being chosen as Yokota Air Force Base "Squadron of the Month", for July. The announcement by Colonel James R. Gunn Jr. was not made until the 1st of August, after all phases of the squadrons activities for the month had been considerated and evaluated competitively with the other units on the base. The points considered in the competition included effectiveness in administration, operation, material, etc. It is believed that our flying safety record for the past year, which remains unmarred by an accident, gave us a considerable number of points toward being the first squadron on the base to win the title since the competition was inaugurated.

As a regard for winning the Pitle, the Base Commanding Officer presented the squadron with enough chickens from the base Chicken farm to throw a "Chicken Fry". The picnic was held on the 20th of August, which incidently coincided with the birthday of the 90th. (The 90th Observation Squadron was activated on the 20th of August 1817 at Kelley Field Texas). Colonel Gunn and other members of his staff were all invited. It iwas obvious from the full stomacks that the chicken was excellent and that a good time was had by all.

4. THREE ESCORT MISSIONS for F-51 type aircraft being ferried to the Phillipines were provided by the 90th during August. Captain Jack P. Smith with 1st Lt Silas G. Upchurch as navigator and M-Sgt Gerald W. McPherson as engineer made the first trip, leaving here on the 16th. The other two excorts departed within the following week, picking up the F-51 aircraft at Itami AFB. 1st Lt Thomas A. Todd and 1st Lt Francis P. Fitzgerald piloted the last two ships in that order. Refueling stops were made at Okinawa on the way to and from Clark Field, near Manila. All three missions were accomplished without incident despite unfavorable weather enroute to and from Clark Field.






