


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90TH BOMBARDMENT SQUADRON (L) 3RD BOMBARDMENT WING (L) APO 328

The 90th Bembardment Squadren (L) continues to be one of the three Squadrens comprising the 3rd Bembardment Group (L), stationed at Yeksta Air Force Base, APO 328, Henshu, Japan.



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#### SECTION II

#### MAJOR ACTIVITIES

1. THE CRITICAL NOSE STRUT SITUATION which left the squadron with only two flyable B-26 aircraft during September was considerably relieved by the arrival of fourteen new struts on the 11th of October. Within three days after their arrival the fourteen grounded aircraft were back in commission and normal flying operations were resumed. The total of 566 flying hours for the menth enabled better than 95% of the rated personnel to complete 60-2 requirements for October, and at the same time lost last menth.

The emphasis of course was placed on instrument and night flying, but a substantial number of skip-bembing and rocket firing missions were scheduled for Mito and Onehara Shima bembing ranges, therby maintaining combat preficiency in these particular activities.

One six-ship formation was leaded with 5-inch HVAR's (Reckets) which were expended on the Onehara Shima range. This particualr recket has been suspended from use for the last six menths pending Air Force investigation of premature explosions. The result enthe investigation is the suspension only of let numbers from which the bad reckets came. All other let numbers are released for further use.

- 2. ON FRIDAY, THE 22ND OF OCTOBER, the 90th dispatched six airplanes with complete crews to Misawa Air Force Base for a 7 day period. Major Kline our commanding officer, headed the mission. The detachment operated from Misawa under classified orders.
- 3. ON THURSDAY, THE 28TH, the squadron participated in a tactical operation which involved practically all flying units of the 314th Air Division. Each squadren of the 3rd Bembardment Group furnished 9 B-26 aircraft for simulated attacks on targets in southern Henshu. The marshalling yards of the city of Hiroshima was designated at the 90th's target. Briefing was held in the 90th Operations building at 0900. The weather was reported as unfavorable by the weather effice, with ceilings ranging from 2000 ft. to 3500 ft. in rain showers over the entire area. The pilots expected the mission to be scrubbed at the last minute, but 314th A.D. assumed the "I think you can make it" attitude, so the 90th departed with nine B-26's as scheduled. The route from base to target was via airways to Nageya .... direct from Naygeya to Oki Gunte thence direct from Oki Gunte south to the target. The ceilings from Naygeya ranged from 700 ft. to 2000 ft. with rain showers. After turning south toward the target the ceilings ranged from 1000 ft. to zero, with continous rain. The fermation led by Captain Jerome Davis, did a 180 turn and returned to base via the same route, without reaching the target. The mission was of 5 hours and fifteen minutes duration. No sightings were made during the trip. The landing time at Yeketa was 1415 hours.

4. A MINOR TAXI ACCIDENT on the 18th Of October blemished the flying safety record of the squadron. It occurred when the parking brakes were accidentally released while the pilot was occupied with closing the canopy with the engines running. The aircraft rolled into the tail assembly of the B-26 parked in front of it on the taxi strip, causing minor damage.

The 90th has flown a little better than 9000 hours during the past fifteen months without a single accident...minor or major. We are thankful

that our record was blemished with a minor rather than a major.

5. FROM THE ENGINEERING SECTION comes the information that the Squadron has completed about 90% of the T.O. compliances applicable to the B-26 aircraft in this unit. The uncompleted ones are either awaiting the arrival of compliance kits or will remain uncompleted by verbal order of the Wing Commanding General.

Since last month, when the responsibility for compliances was shifted from centralized maintenance to the squadron, great strides have been made

in complying with the applicable T.O.'s.

Fourteen (14) nacelle fuel cells were recently received by the engineering section from base supply, as part of the program to comply with relining cells with spenge rubber as required by T.O. 01-40AJ-114. After
receipt of the cells it was found that their condition was so deteriorated
that they could not be used in an airplane and require condemnation. It was
believed that improper storage and lack of inspection by supply personnel
was the reason for the condition. The squadron Tech Inspector found that
the cells had not received an official imagection since 1945.

As usual the engineering personnel worked considerably overtime during the entire month in order to keep the aircraft in commission. The fact that most of the airplances had been grounded for over a month made the extra work

necessary to keep oil and fuel leaks to a minimum.

lst Lt. David A. Jones, the present engineering efficer for the "Pairadice Squadron" made the remark to this historical efficer....and it is considered to be worthy of mention... that the engineering personnel seemed to be going at their work during October with a renewed vigor that was good to observe. The probable reason is that with all the aircraft back in flying condition, due to the receipt of the nose strats, the mechanics are able to work on semething that they know is going to fly when they finish. The situation brought about by the grounding of the aircraft for such a long period, awaiting arrival of parts through supply channels, is definitely detrimental to the merale of those who work on the airplanes, not to mention that of those who fly them.

6. WORD WAS RECEIVED on the 28th of the month that the 90th would again participate in field manuevers under simulated combat conditions. The tentative departure date was set as 8 November 1948. The base for operations and the length of stay is unknown at this writing.




7. SQUADRON COMMUNICATIONS maintenance at the present time is being accomplished by a consolidated Group communications shop. This system will continue to function until such time as the squadrons have set up their individual sections and T.O.&E. equipment now on requisition arrives.

One of the greatest difficulties concerning communications maintenance right now is the lack of IFF equipment and the testing instruments needed for the equipment on hand.

8. A DRIVE WAS BEGUN during October on Athletic and Recreational activities with the intent of having every officer and airman in the squadron engaging in some sport or recreational activity. The aim is toward one hundred per cent participation. Competition is growing between the squadrons, with leagues organized in football, volleyball, and basketball for fall and winter seasons. There are also teams at both squadron and base level in bowling, handball, waights, boxing, photography, handicrafts, golf, skeet, etc. To date approximately fifty percent of the 90th personnel are engaging actively in some form of recreation. We look forward with confidence to 100% participation by the end of Nevember.
