

He was first sergeant of the 90th from Sept. 15, 1941 to Apr. 1, 1942, when he was promoted to tech sergeant. He had recently been reported to be ready to come back to his outfit and news of his death came as a shock.—AES

Lay Your Wagers, Boys!


Bookmakers will not only take bets on the horse races but on the track events and tug-of-war as well.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed on the importance of engineering crews in their relation to success of operations and safety of the men who fly in their planes. For that reason we reproduce an item from Air Force, official publication of the USAAF:

"You've heard of pilot fatigue but you've probably never stopped to think that long, gruelling stretches on the job make us subject to MECH-FATIGUE.

"Mech-fatigue - which is the mental or physical letdown from overwork or strain—can result in carelessness, forgetfulness and inaccuracy. Watch yourself on the long work stretches; ASK FOR A HREAK IF YOU FEEL IT COMING ON.

"Talk to your line chief; he'll know you are not just goldbricking.
"Adequate rest, food, recreation and exercise will help you keep yourself in good physical condition and ward off MECH-FATIGUE.

F/O Monroe on CQ, F/O Caldwell in Tower At Hickam Field

Flight Officers Horace B. Monroe and George P. Caldwell, now of the 89th Attack Squadron, were eyewitnesses to the Pearl Harbor tragedy of Dec. 7, 1941.

Serving a three-year enlistment from 1939 to 1942, F/O Monroe (then sergeant) was assigned to a pursuit squadron then stationed at Wheeler Field, Hawaii, as an aircraft mechanic:

On Sunday, Dec. 7, he was detailed as charge of quarters when a formation of 50 or more Jap light bombers approached the field, circled, peeled off simultaneously and released their deadly cargo.

The earth seemed to tremble and rock, Monroe said, and the impact bursting bombs was so great that all the pursuit planes, lined up wing to wing for the usual weekend inspection, were blown to bits and the entire airfield left a shambles. Damage, according to Monroe, was greater than at first estimated.

"All Hell Broke Loose"

There were many casualties, Monroe said, and everyone was shocked at the treachery of the Japs. A few minutes later the Nips continued their methodic devastation of Pearl Harbor, approximately seven miles from Wheeler. It was as though "all hell broke loose."

F/O Caldwell, on the other hand, was a radio operator atop a tower at Hickam Field, several miles away.

Monroe sailed for the States in April, 1942, for flight training. He at -tended Santa Ana and other flying schools in western California. He again sailed for foreign service in April; 1943, this time headed for New Guinea, where he joined the 3rd Group May 22. Likes A-20s

Monroe likes the A-20 and is proud to be a member of the 89th. He said: "I'm sure glad as hell I'm flying A-20s 'cause now I can really HIT 'EM HARD AND WHERE IT HURTS THE MOST! I'm going if it's the last thing I do. There are the light of this world, and it's for them that I'm dead set on repaying the rat Tojo that debt ... and with interest, too!"
