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

- MT. SILAY AREA 20 M10 Napalm wing tanks, 6 x 100 lb napalm bombs, 38 x 250 lb 8-15 sec delay demos and 132 x 250 lb 4-5 sec delay parademos dropped. 58,200 x .50 cal name expended in strafing.
- SINILOAN AREA 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 14 x 250 lb 4-5 sec delay demos, and 35 x 250 lb 4-5 sec delay parademos were dropped. 12,500 x .50 cal ammo expended in strafine.
- ARDA demos and 24 x 250 lb 4-5 sec delay parademos were dropped. 11,400 x .50 cel ammo expended in strafing.
- ALEPUNYA HILLS

FFO 91E-5. At 1300/I on 1 April 1945, nine A-20's took off from Elmore Strip, Mindoro and flew to Legaspi, Luzon where they were told by the ground station "Cracker 4" to return to base because there was no target due to weather. All bombs and ammunition were returned.

FFO 94E-13. Eight A-20's took off at 0730/I from Elmore Strip on 4 April 1945 and flew to Megros Island in support of the ground troops. The squadron leader called the S.A.P. "Night-shirt" and was told to follow "Firecracker Red" (two Corsairs), who would lead the squadron over the target. The specific target designated by "Firecracker Red" was two parallel roads 12 miles apart, running east of Negritos to the saddle between Sicaba Diutay Peak and Mt. Mandalagan. Vehicles, artillery pieces, and tanks were bombed and strafed with the majority of bombs falling on a concentration of vehicles five miles east of Negritos. 4 M10 napalm filled wing tanks, 8 x 250 lb parademos were dropped, destroying four vehicles and 12 to 15 drums of gas. 12,500 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended, destroying three vehicles and damaging several more. Fifty to sixty vehicles and three light tanks and approximately one hundred new trenches and dugouts filled with Japs, were strafed with unobserved results. The Japs were surprised by this attack and many sedans and trucks were parked in the road with doors open while the Nips were running toward slit trenches. Five to six new underground shelters were seen on the side of a gulley south of the south road. One type K-21 camera was used to photograph the strike. The right engine on one A-20 began to cut out on arriving over the target and it returned to base with another A-20 providing cover. 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 4×250 lb parademos were jettisoned north of Guimaras Strait by the A-20 with engine trouble and the A-20 providing cover, returned 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 4 x 250 lb parademos.

FFO 94E-13. At noon on 4 April, two A-20's of this squadron took off from Elmore Strip with seven A-20's of the 13th Squadron to attack an enemy concentration in the Negritos area, Negros Island. The two airplanes of this squadron made five passes from north to south over the target, setting fire to and destroying a black sedan, thought to be a Chevrolet, and definitely damaging four to six other trucks by strafing. Near misses by bombs probably damaged two more trucks. Three trucks were seen in the east end of the target area and one at the west end loaded with what looked like baggage. All four vehicles were in good condition. 4 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 8 x 250 lb parademos were dropped and 3500 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended along the road on a ridge south of Malago River. No A/A fire was observed by these planes, although some sirplanes of the 13th Squadron received meager fire.

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FFO 95E-12. On 5 April at 0830/I, six A-20's of this squadron, flew to the Legaspi area where they checked in with "Oakum", who ordered them to hit Jap troops at Malabog; the target to be designated by mortar smoke shells. 3 M10 napalm wing tanks, 8 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 24 x 250 lb parademos were dropped and 7,400 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended in strafing. An ammunition dump concealed in a wooden building, received a direct hit by a napalm wing tank, resulting in a large fire and many small explosions. Two other buildings were destroyed by fire and several more damaged. Several trenches were seen under the trees in Malabog Town and on a hilltop 1000 yards south of Bariwy. Three wood and barbed wire road blocks were

seen along the road between Pilarun and Malabog and several ditches were cut across the road at Tigasaw, Barayong, and Mariawa village. 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos failed to explode. "Oakum" stated that the bombing was excellent. One M10 napalm wing tank was returned due to failure to release over the target. Three A-20's of the 13th Squadron flew with the six airplanes of this squadron on this mission.

FFO 96E-14. Six A-20's took off at 1300/I on 6 April to support ground troops on Negros Island but only three airplanes reached the arget. Two of the A-20's had to turn back because the left engine of each plane was cutting out and another A-20 covered those in trouble. "Nightshirt" gave the squadron leader the tar get as two parallel east to west roads, starting one mile east of Negrito's. 4 x 100 lb napalm bombs and 8 x 250 lb parademos were dropped on trucks on the south road, 2 miles east of Negritos, destroying two trucks by fire. Supplies were scattered by a near miss on a camouflaged supply dump at the east end of the south road. 2 x 100 lb napalm bombs and 4 x 250 lb parademos were dropped on the north road, starting a small fire at the entrance to a cave with a napalm bomb and damaging an underground camouflaged shelter with a near miss. Many foxholes and trenches along both sides of the north road were thoroughly strafed with unobserved results. Propaganda leaflets were dropped over the target as was ordered. Meager, light, inaccurate machine gun fire came from an unidentified position on the north road. One K-17 type camera was used to photograph the mission. Several Japs were seen running toward foxholes near the north road and many small supply dumps were noted along the south road. Four Corsairs were making attacks the wrong way and they cut into the A-20's strafing pattern, but no damage was done. 4 x 100 lb napalm bombs and 8 x 250 1b parademos were returned and 2 x 100 1b napalm bombs and 4 x 250 lb parademos were jettisoned by the three airplanes that failed to reach the target. 5,900 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended in strafing both roads.

FFO 97E-13. Five A-20's took off at 0900/I on 7 April and flew to the Lake Taal area in support of ground troops. Malaraya Hill, the target designated by "Curless #1" located in Balabag town, was hit by all five airplanes of this squadron and one A-20 from the 89th Squadron which accompanied them. Four passes were made from south to north over Malaraya Hill. The five A-20's dropped 10 M10 napalm wing tanks and 20 x 250 lb parademos, the majority of which exploded on the hill, and expended 9,300 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition. One bomb started a gray smoke fire in a gulley on the north side of the hill. Propaganda leaflets were dropped as ordered. One parademo failed to explode. A K-21 and a K-22 type camera were used to photograph the strike. "Curless #1" reported the bombing as being excellent.

FFO 89E-5. On 8 April, three A-20's took off at 0800/I with the 89th Squadron and hit a Jap motor pool southeast of Sulac, in the Lake Taal area. "Curless 1" gave the target and "Doubling Junior", the Third Group's L-5, directed the attack. The three airplanes dropped 6 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 12 x 250 lb parademos with unobserved results other than all bombs hitting in the target area. No strafing was done, in compliance with the request of "Curless 1". Photos were taken with a K-17 camera. Ten burned out trucks were seen in a grove of trees 300 yards west of Sulac. Our troops were seen on Malaraya Hill.

FFO 98E-7. In mid-afternoon of 8 April 1945, four A-20's took off to give support to the ground troops on he ros Island. On arriving over Bacolod Strip, the squadron leader called the S.A.P. "Nightshirt", who told them to attack a wooded area west of an L-5 that was orbiting in the Negritos area. The four airplanes made six single ship passes over the target, dropping 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 4 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 16 x 250 lb parademos and expending 7,900 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition. All bombs hit in the target area, but results were unobserved due to dense foliage. A small supply dump was set on fire by strafing. There was inaccurate A/A fire from machine guns and two 40mm weapons. The target was photographed with a K-21 type camera. A camouflaged truck was seen under some trees in the target area and there were three small clearings with tracks leading into the trees 12 miles northeast of Negritos. As this squadron arrived over Negros, the 417th Group was attacking too far west of the assigned target, due to poor radio reception and a misunderstanding of instructions by the coordinator, who was in a B-24, and they were hitting our own troops. Both our airplanes and "Nightshirt" kept calling "Rebel 1" and "Rebel 2", the 417th Group A-20's, for fifteen minutes before they finally left the target. When the A/P's of this squadron had finished their attack, "Nightshirt" told the squadron leader that they had hit the right target. All four airplanes returned and landed safely at base at 1720/I.

Fragmentary Field Orders covering the above operations will be found in the appendix starting on page ff.

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FFO 99E-9. This squadron had two A-20's flying to Legaspi on 9 April 1945, with six airplanes of the 89th Squadron. The formation took off at 0900/I and checked in with "Oakum" on arriving over Legaspi, to get a target and was assigned one 5000 yards SSW of Camalig. The exact target was marked with smoke and the A-20's of this squadron made six single ship passes from north to south with the A-20's of the 89th Squadron. 8 x 250 lb, parademos and 4 x 250 lb demos were dropped along with 3,500 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition being expended. Results of the attack were generally unobserved. There was no A/A encountered. Two small shacks were seen in the target area.

FFO 100E-11. At 1230/I on 10 April 1945, three A-20's took off to provide ground support in the Lake Taal area. They were accompanied by two A-20's of the 8th Squidron and one from the 89th Squadron. "Curless" asked the six airplanes to bomb and strafe a deep ravine running northwest to southeast, approximately 800 yards west of Dita. The ravine was marked at both ends and the forward positions of friendly ground forces were also marked with smoke. The three A-20's from this squadron dropled 2 M10 napalm wing tanks, 4 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 12 x 250 lb parademos and expended 5,900 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition. The run was made from north to south over the target, as requested by "Curless". Results were unobserved due to dense vegatation. A K-22 type camera photographed the mission and propaganda leaflets were dropped as ordered.

FFO 101E-9. Three A-20's took off at 0825/I on 11 April 1945 to support ground troops in the Lake Taal area. The target given by "Curless" was designated by smoke bombs dropped from an L-5. It was an area approximately 750 yards WSW of Dita, near the base of Mt. Macolod. Two M10 napalm wing tanks, 4 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 12 x 250 lb paradehos were dropped and 5,550 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended in strafing, all with unobserved results due to the dense foliage. There was inaccurate machine gun fire from the target, but this position was later silenced. There were seven machine gun positions firing from the base of Mt. Macolod, but it was inaccurate fire. The target was photographed with a K-17 capera and propaganda leaflets were dropped. Numerous foxholes, frenches, and dugouts were seen in the target area. Three A-20's of the 89th Squadron flew with the airplanes of the 90th.

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FFO 102E-9. Three A-20's accompanied three A-20's of the 13th Squadron to Bulan on 12 April 1945, taking off at 0900/I. The actual target was an area three miles north east of Bulan and it was marked with smoke grenades. Four bombing and strafing runs were made by the three A-20's of this squadron, dropping 6 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos and 12 x 250 lb, 4-5 second delay fused parademos and expending 5,550 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition with unobserved results. Numerous paths were seen in the target area. Seven caves were seen near the base of a hill at Eulan Strip. A possible bridge under construction over the river two to three miles ESE of Bulan. The old bridge was destroyed. One parademo burst while about ten feet from the ground.

FFO 105E-13. On 13 April 1945 at 0700/I, two A-20G's from this squadron took off with six A-20H's of the 8th Squadron and three A-20G's from the 89th Squadron to give ground support on Negros Island. "Nightshirt", the S.A.P., came in clearly and gave two targets to be sesignated by mortar shells. Target #1, a small hill and deep gulley approximately one mile southeast of Negritos, was to be bombed only and the two A-20's dropped 2 M10 napalm wing tanks, 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos, and 8 x 250 lb parademos on the target with unobserved results. Target #2, an area 500 yards east of target #1, was thoroughly strafed with 4,000 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition. The targets were photographed with a K-17 camera. Two or three small caves were seen in target #1 area. Friendly positions were marked with red and white panels and red smoke. "Nightshirt" stated that the bombing was excellent.

FFO 105E-12. Three A-20G's took off at 0700/I on 15 April 1945 with six A-20H's of the 8th Squadron, to give ground support on Negros Island again. "Nightshirt" assigned a target on the northwest slope of Mt. Mandalagan and marked it with smoke. Nine single ship passes were made from west to east, dropping 2 M10 napalm wing tanks, 4 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos, and 12 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused parademos and expending 5,500 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition in strafing. Several trucks and two piles of supplies were probably destroyed. Inaccurate A/A fire came from a position just north of the target. Photos were taken with a K-17 type camera.

FFO 106E-11. On 16 April 1945, five A-20G's accompanied by two A-20H's of the 13th Squadron, took off at 0900/I to provide ground support on Negros island, but were told by "Nightshirt" to return to base because all strikes had been cancelled. All airplanes landed safely at McGuire Strip, Mindoro, with all bombs and ammunition.

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FFO 107E-6. On 17 April 1945, five A-20G's of this squadron plus four A-20H's of the 8th Squadron took off from McGuire Strip, Mindoro, at 0630/I to provide ground support on Negros Island. "Nightshirt" assigned a target as the northwest slope of hill 3155 (370933 - Imbang River, 1:50,000) to be designated by smoke. The five A-20's of this squadron dropped 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 6 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos, and 20 x 250 lb parademos and expended 8,950 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition, all with unobserved results. The target was photographed with a type K-17 camera.

FFO 108E-7. The first of two missions flown 18 April 1945, was ground support in the Legaspi area. Six A-20's took off at 0745/I and checked in with "Oakum" when they arrived over Legaspi. The target, a small hilltop 2000 yards southeast of Guinobatan, was marked with mortar shells. The bombing run was made from southeast to northwest, as requested by "Oakum", but the target was not strafed, in compliance with "Oakum's" orders. 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 6 x 250 lb, 8-15 second delay fused demos, and 24 x 250 lb parademos were dropped with unobserved results. One K-21 and one K-17 type cameras photographed the strike.

FFO 108E-14. The second mission on 18 April 1945, was six A-20G's providing ground support on Negros Island, taking off at 1358/I. All the airplanes reached the target but only five made the attack because one A-20 was hit with 25mm A/A in the left engine, causing the airplane to crash into the foothills and explode. Both Pilot and Gunner were undoubtedly killed. 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 6 x 250 lb, 8-15 second fused demos, and 20 x 250 lb parademos were dropped and 7,150 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended along a ridge running northwest and southeast, 3500 yards north of hill 3155 (Imbang River, 1:50,000), with unobserved results. Several "L" shaped trenches and two camouflaged pill boxes were seen in the target area. Three A-20G's of the 89th flew with this squadron.

FFO 109E-10. At 0645/I on 19 April 1945, four A-20's took off to hit hill 3155 on Negros again. Three airplanes reached the target, dropping 2 M10 napalm wing tanks, 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second fused demos, and 8 x 250 lb parademos on the northeast slope of the hill. All the bombs hit in the assigned area. 2 x 250 lb, 8-15 second fused demos and 4 x 250 lb parademos were dropped on Jap A/A positions on a ridge running northwest and southeast, approximately 1600 yards ENE of the first target. Two parademos over shot the ridge and the other four bombs exploded on the ridge causing nil visible damage. Both targets were strafed with 2,800 rounds of 50 caliber ammunition. One A-20 returned imme-

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FFO 109E-10. (Continued) diately after take off, returning all bombs, because the main landing gear failed to retract. Moderate and accurate A/A fire came from four 20mm or 25mm guns, holing one airplane. There was machine gun fire from the same position. An A-20 of the 8th Squadron was shot down by this position. The target was photographed with a type K-22 camera. The squadron leader refused to make a dry run over the target as requested by "Nightshirt". The 89th Squadron did an excellent job covering the A/A positions. The airplanes landed safely at McGuire Strip at 0945/I.

FFO 110E-13. Six A-20's took off at 0900/I on 20 April to hit a Jap troop concentration in the Legaspi Area. The S.A.P. "Oak-um" gave the target as a small ridge 400 yards south of Curry and the area was marked with smoke bombs from an L-5. 12 x 250 lb, 4-5 second delay fused demos and 24 x 250 parademos were dropped on the ridge, causing two fairly large explosions, starting a small fire with black smoke to 400 feet, and destroying five grass shacks. The target was strafed with 10,400 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition, silencing a 25mm gun position. There was some medium and accurate A/A fire from a probable 25mm position east of the target area and machine gun fire from the target area and the east end of Curry town. One K-21 and one K-22 type cameras were used to photograph the mission. The iron railroad bridge across the river near Pamili, was out of commission and a convoy of military trucks, thought to be friendly, was seen heading north on highway #1, approximately one mile south of Pamili town. Naga Airdrome was thought to be mined. Three A-20H's of the 8th Squadron flew with the six airplanes from the 90th. All planes landed safely at McGuire Strip at 1205/I.

FFO 111E-5. On the 21st of April 1945, eight A-20G's and one A-20H of this squadron, took off at 0700/I to support the ground troops in the vicinity of Camalig, Legaspi area, Luzon. "Oakum" said to bomb and not strafe the ridge top running north to south approximately 1800 yards southeast of Camalig. The target was marked with white smoke shells. 6 M10 napalm wing tanks, 11 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused demos, and 31 x 250 lb parademos were dropped with unobserved results. A K-17 and one K-21 type cameras photographed the mission. Mt. Mayon, the nearby volcano, was smoking more than usual.

FFO 112E-7. At 1445/I on 22 April 1945, nine A-20G's flew to the Legaspi area, Southern Luzon, in support of the ground troops there. The target assigned by "Oakum", was the west slope of Camilig Hill and it was marked by white smoke shells. Only eight airplanes made two bombing runs over the target on a heading of 1100. "Oakums" request for no strafing was complied with. 16 x 250 lb, 4-5 second delay fused demos and 32 x 250 lb parademos were dropped, hitting in the target with unobserved results.

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Propaganda leaflets were dropped as ordered. One airplane had trouble with the right engine and was forced to return after salvoing the bombs safe in the water north of Tablas Island. The A-20 landed safely on McGuire Strip at 1555/I. One type K-17 and one type K-21 cameras were used to photograph the mission. There was a grass shack aftire on the east slope of Camalig Hill. Friendly troops were south, west, and east of the target and their forward elements were marked by red smoke. The bombing was pronounced as excellent. The eight airplanes landed safely at McGuire Strip at 1720/I.

FFO 113E-5. Eight A-20's went to the Legaspi area again on 23 April 1945, taking off at 0745/I. "Oakum" assigned the target and ordered no strafing, due to the proximity of friendly troops and requested that the bombing run be made on a heading of 130 degrees. Two runs were made over a gulley on the west slope of Camalig Hill, dropping 16 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused demos and 30 x 250 lb parademos with nil visible damage. One K-17 and one K-21 type cameras photographed the target. The forward positions of friendly troops were marked by red smoke. One airplane of the 89th Squadron flew with this squadron. All airplanes landed safely at McGuire Strip at 1030/I.

FFO 114E-6. At 0830/I on 24 April 1945, three A-20G's took off with six A-20's of the 89th Squadron and flew to the Legaspi area on another support mission. The target, a hill one mile southeast of Camalig, was marked with white smoke and two single-ship passes were made on a heading of 130 degrees. 12 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused parademos and 6 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused demos were dropped with unobserved results due to dense smoke and dust. The target was not strafed, in compliance with "Oakum's" orders. Propaganda leaflets were dropped. All airplanes landed safely on McGuire Strip at 1045/I.

FFO l15E-10. Ground support in the Batangas area was the target for 25 April 1945, when six A-20G's took off from McGuire Strip at 1300/I. "Curless" ordered the squadron to attack the area marked with white smoke on the west slope of hill 2218, 2500 yards north east of Malaraya hill. 4 N10 napalm wing tanks and 23 x 250 lb parademos were dropped with 80% falling in the target area. Inaccurate machine gun fire came from the hill approximately 500 yards south of the target. One K-21 and one K-24 type cameras were used to photograph the strike. Several caves were seen on the west slope of Mt. Matasha Bundoc, 200 yards east of the target and our troop positions were designated by red smoke southwest and west of the target. Three A-20H's of the 8th Squadron flew with the 90th. All ships landed safely at base at 1505/I. One parademo failed to release over the target and was returned.

Fragmentary Field orders covering the above operations will be found in the Appendix starting on page 7+.

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FFO 116E-13. Six A-20G's took off at 0830/I from McGuire Strip on 26 April 1945 and flew to the Batangas area in support of ground troops. "Curless" assigned the target as Hill #2380, 2500 yards northeast of Malaraya Hill. 4 MlO napalm wing tanks, 8 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused demos, and 24 x 250 lb parademos were dropped and 9,300 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition were expended in strafing. There was nil visible damage. Propaganda leaflets were dropped over the target. Meager, light, and incurate automatic weapons fire came from the target area. The target was adequately marked with white smoke shells and was photographed with a type K-17 camera. Three A-20's of the 89th Squadron flew with the 90th Squadron.

FFO 119E-12. At 0905/I on 29 April 1945, nine A-20G's took off from McGuire Strip and flew to the vicinity of Siniloan in support of ground troops there. "Outlive #2" gave directions for two target area to be attacked (one area to be bombed and the other to be strafed) and requested that the bombing run be made from southwest to northeast. 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 14 x 250 lb, 4-5 second fused demos, and 35 x 250 lb parademos were dropped on the north slope of a hill just south of the main road, 4500 yards northeast of Siniloan, destroying one grass shack. The main road, 2000 yards northeast of the area bombed, was thoroughly strafed with 12,500 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition, destroying two small shacks on the north side of the road. Propaganda leaflets were dropped as ordered. There was inaccurate machine gun fire from a hut at 415524 (Mabayat, 1:50,000). One K-21 and one K-24 type cameras were used to photograph the mission. One 250 lb parademo failed to release and was returned. All airplanes landed safely at base at 1150/I.

FFO 120E-14. At 0700/I on 30 April 1945, nine A-20G's took off to provide ground support again in the Batangas area, Luzon.

"Curless" directed the squadron leader to bomb and strafe the fork of the river 1400 yarás SSW of Bunsulan Hills on a heading of 180°. 4 M10 napalm wing tanks, 14 x 250 lb, 8-15 second fused demos, and 36 x 250 lb, 8-15 second fused parademos were dropped, causing nil visible damage. The squadron had fired two short bursts (350 rounds of .50 caliber ammunition) when he was asked by "Curless" to cease strafing. Propaganda leaflets were dropped over the target. Machine gun fire from the target area holed one airplane. The target was photographed with two type K-21 cameras. The forward positions of friendly troops were marked with red smoke and panels. All airplanes landed safely at base at 0945/I.

- 1. In accordance with AR 345-105 and AAF Regulation No. 20-8, submit herewith the history of this organization for the month of April 1945, which has been inspected and verified by the undersigned.
- 2. The material submitted was prepared by Captain Donald Macomber, Jr., 0-856200, Air Corps. Facts and observations included in the narrative and not otherwise credited are based on the personal knowledge and opinions of Captain Macomber.

Samuel M. Frederick, Samuel M. Frederick, Major, Air Corps, Commanding.

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The month of april found the squadron well set up on Mindoro Island. Because the camp site was in an old rice paddy and because of the impending rainy season, gravel was hauled daily from the river banks to make the area a little more livable.

Lieutenant Roland Bell, the communications officer, pulled a real coup by getting a brand new public address system and getting it set up in the squadron area. Loud speakers were set up in the enlisted men's area and in the officers' area. Music is played during certain hours in the morning and afternoon and announcements may be made at any hour of the day. The two outstanding records for the month were: 1. "Rum and Goca Cola" and 2. "Cocktails for Two." In fact, these two recordings were so popular that they had to be kept under lock and key and be guarded every night. The latest news is broadcasted daily over the "Bell" net work along with other announcements pertaining to the welfare of the squadron.

Congratulations to both Lieutenant Hugie and Lieutenant Moberly on receiving their promotions to First Lieutenant. Both officers had originally been commissioned with the ground forces in the Engineer Corps and Field Artillery respectively. After spending over thirty months in grade, their silver bars have been awarded.

The group coca cola machine was put into operation this month and it has been a great morale booster. Plent of ice cold carbonated coke is now available both morning and afternoon and for the price of 10 centavos, five cents, for a canteen cup full.

The enlisted men of the squadron organized a champion soft ball team called the "Faradise 10". The name was derived from the squadron insignia which is a pair of dice. The team was really whipped into shape by the middle of the month and out of 13 games they have lost but two. The officers' soft ball team, captained by Lieutenant "Nock" Buckholz or form 1-a our nefarious navigator, jumped off for a slow start, but later gathered speed with a final count of 5 wins to 4 losses.

Cock fights, the greatest of Fili ino sports, have at last become part of the 3rd Group's schedule. Every Sunday afternoon at five sharp, the champion roosters of each squadron are matched in the ring. Hundreds of peace change hands during this weekly event.

The 90th Squadron was the only squadron that didn't have any fighting birds. After much needling from the group as well as the other squadrons, our commanding officer, Major Kline, decided to get a bird to uphold the honor of the squadron. After much bartering and waving of hands, two mangy looking roosters finally appeared in the squadron and a special cage was built for them.

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Captain Fred Mead, the adjutant, called his bird "Blood and Guts" and Major Kline called his "Castor Oil". It was decided to give both birds a combat trial prior to the weekly fights. "Blood and Guts" and "Castor Oil" were placed in an improvised ring and after the usual preliminaries were let loose. "Castor Oil" took one look at "Blood and Guts" and then committed the unexcusable. He ran. Yes, ran all around the ring trying to escape the flashing claws and beak of "Blood and Guts". Then of a sudden both birds quit and ambled around the ring in search of food. The scene was so disheartening that both birds were sold for a song and to date the 90th Squadron has no champion.

Major Kline, Major Frederick and First Lieutenant Cordes from the 90th Squadron participated in two strikes to Formosa on the 24th and 25th of April. The mission on 24 April was to attack a butanol plant at Kagi. The strike was very successful and the butanol plant was completely destroyed by fire and demolition bombs. Lieutenant Cordes held the distinction of destroying the first locomotive in the history of this squadron. The mission on the 25th of april was to attack a butanol plant at Taito on the southwest coast of Formosa. Again the strike was successful and the plant was left enveloped in flames.

Toward the end of April, the group leased two rest houses in Manila near San Juan Heights. Every four days ten enlisted men from the squadron are sent up to Manila for a rest cure. This practice has raised the morale enormously. One quart of whiskey and twelve cans of beer are alloted to each man which has proved to be sufficient. Due to the law of supply and demand, prices have sky-rocketed and a plate of ham and eggs can be compared with a filet mignon back home. The flight surgeon now talks to each man prior to his departure and gives him a V-kit. Though the VD rate is extremely high in Manila, the squadron has had very little trouble in this line.

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Major Stanley D. Kline, 0-675235 C.O., 90th Sq., 15 Oct. 1944-30 April 1945



Major Samuel M. Frederick, 0-407098 C.O., 90th Sq., 30 April 1945-

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Major Stanley D. Kline was born in Waverly, New York, May 11 1920. He attended grade and high schools in his home town. In 1936, Major Kline and his brother purchased a second hand cub and, after piecing it together so it would work, learned to fly the hard way. After mastering the technique, he learned to fly airplanes with more horsepower until he finally earned a commercial license. In 1938 he got a job as a pilot working for the Sintilla Magneto Company, flying the company wheels around the country. He held this job until 1940 when he resigned to enlist in the army as a private. He went through mechanics school at Chanute Field and rose steadily in the ranks. Early in 1942, Major Kline applied for flying cadet training and in July 1942 he turned in his master sergeants stripes for the propeller and wing insignic of the flying cadets. Due to his early training in aviation, Major Kline knew airplanes from both the flying and maintenance end. Because of this, primary basic and advanced training all passed by with little or no incident.

On 20 March 1943, Major Kline received his silver wings and brand new gold bars. It goes without saying that he put a few of his underclassmen in a frantic brace just to prove to himself that he was a commissioned officer at last. In July 1943, Major Kline was sent overseas as a combat replacement.

In September 1943, Major Kline was assigned to the 13th Squadron of the Third Group, then stationed at Dobodura near Buna, New Guinea. He received his baptism of fire over such places as Rabaul and Wewak where the Japs were still a really formiable foe. He later flew missions over Hollandia, Biak, Manokwari and other heavily fortified Jap bases in the N.E.I.

On September 22, 1944, Major Kline, then a captain, was transferred to the 90th Squadron as operations officer. Major Prokopovitz, commanding the squadron, left for the United States on September 23, 1944 and Major Kline was made our new Commanding Officer.

At this time, the 3rd Group was practically taken off combat status and rumors flew thick and fast concerning our part in the empending Fhilippines show. October 20, 1944 and the victorious landing on Leyte. The 3rd Group still sat at Hollandia awaiting orders. The ground echelon was sent to Leyte in November and then in January to Mindoro. All this time the air echelon sat doing nothing at Hollandia. Finally Major fline and the rest of the air crews appeared 25 January and all was well again. Major Kline led numerous missions over Luzon, the Visayas and Mindanao and has received an air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster for his combat flying. On 30 April major Kline received orders sending him to Group Headquarters as the new S-3 officer. The initiative, as well as the personal interest in both the administrative and tactical running of the squadron shown by Major Kline as squadron commanding officer gained him the admiration and respect of both the officers and enlisted men. The entire squadron wished him the best of luck in his new post.

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Major Samuel M. Frederick was born at Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, 17 april 1919. At the tender age of six weeks, he and his family headed west and made their permanent home at white-Fish, Montana (no kidding, there is such a place), near the southern extremity of Glacier National Park. Major Frederick attended grade and high schools at whitefish. He decided to become a civil engineer and spent six months at Alabama University and University of Michigan, whereupon he transferred to Montana State College. He spent two years training at Montana. In January of 1940, Major Frederick, being extremly interested in flying, put in his application for flying cadet training and in August was accepted. He went through primary, basic, and finally advanced training; finally graduating 14 March 1941. He remained at Stockton as an instructor in advanced single engine school until February 1942. Major Frederick then transferred to Victorville where he worked as a bombardier pilot and engineering officer until he became a squadron commanding officer. In April of 1943, he went to B-25 transition school at Mather Field and was sent as a B-25 instructor to La Junta, Colorado. Major Frederick remained there as a squadron commanding officer until late in October of 1944. On 26 October 1944, he was sent overseas and reported to the Third Group on 16 November 1944. Major Frederick went to Leyte and was also in the historic passage from Leyte to Mindoro. Major Frederick was assigned to the 13th Squadron as operations officer on 13 January 1945. He led numerous missions with the 13th Squadron until his transfer to the 90th Squadron on 30 April 1945. The squadron takes great pleasure in wishing Major Frederick the best of luck in his new command.

SECRET

On the afternoon of 19 April 1945, six A-20 crews of the 90th Squadron and three A-20 crews of the 89th Squadron assembled in the intelligence tent to be briefed on a late mission to Negros Island in close support of the ground troops west of Silay Airdrome. After the operations officer had given the plan of attack and "Cloudy Joe", the group weather expert, had given his usual CaVU spiel, the pilots and gunners got up, stretched and headed for their vehicles. It was a happy day for chief gunner, T/Sgt. Robert F. Bisdorf, 3657178, of Hasbrouck Heights, New Jersey. This was to be his last official combat mission prior to his departure for the States. For once, he gleefully gathered up the propaganda leaflets and promised faithfully to score a direct hit on the target with them.

After the usual last minute dash to the latrine, the combat crews headed for McGuire Strip for take-off. At 1358/I, the nine A-20s roared down the strip at 20 second intervals and circled to the left in order to assemble in formation. The 6th airplane to take off was piloted by 2nd Lt. Edward J. Kunzer, 0-759377, of Elmhurst, Illinois and T/Sgt. Bisdorf was his gunner. Lieutenant Kunzer quickly joined the second element, fitting into the #3 or left wing position.

The nine airplanes then headed in a southeast direction from Mindoro for the north coast of ranay Island and hence to the target. The ground station at Silay Airdrome told the squadron, on arrival, to attack a ridge northwest of the Jap stronghold at Hill #3155. The Japs had taken the anti-aircraft guns that once defended their coastal airdromes at Fabrica, Malogo, Alicante, Bacolod, etc. and had dragged them into the mountains to the east to defend their fortified positions. The nine A-20s, on locating their specific target, let down to minimum altitude and approached the ridge on a heading of 1350, with all airplanes in trail.

As Lieutenant Kunzer approached the target, the Japs opened up with medium anti-aircraft fire concentrating on his airplane. Before he even reached the target, his left engine was in flames. Due to the nature of the mountaineous terrain, he was forced to turn to the left-into his damaged engine. The airplane, unable to maintain sufficient altitude, crashed into the trecherous terrain behind the enemy lines and exploded. No one saw any survivors, but there is a scant possibility that perhaps the crew escaped.

Lieutenant Munzer and Sergeant Bisdorf are classed as missing in action and it is the feverent hope of the squadron that they will both show up some day.

3. Intelligence proceedure for the month of april was strictly of a routine nature with all targets being confined to close ground support with our ground troops on Negros Island and in the Batangas and Legaspi Districts of Southern Luzon. Sue to the efficient work of the 6th army liaison of icer attached to group headquarters, our pilots were always informed as to the most recent positions of friendly as well as enemy troops. As a result, the missions have been successful as proved by the telegrams received from both the 6th and 6th armies.

4. The section was extremely fortunate in receiving a new L. C. Smith typewriter which has helped tremendously in the typing of awards recommendations, the monthly history and the usual routine reports.

- a. Tactics, on the whole, remained the same except for a general tendency toward the use of more than one plane per pass at the

target. Due to the nature of the majority of the targets assigned, which were mostly in mountainous terrain, the single plane pass was used almost exclusively. Successive losses and damage, especially in the Negros area, has led to a closer survey of the target area, using more than one plane to each pass made whenever possible, and limiting the number of passes to two runs.

b. Some difficulty in coordination with ground support stations occurred, again, particulary in the Negros area (Nightshirt), making it necessary that squadron leaders depend wholly upon their own discretion in the advisiability of hitting the assigned target and the tactics to be used.

5. Scope of Missions

Missions were carried out in the Negros, Legaspi, and Batangas areas, in direct support of ground troops. Two pilots, Major Stanley D. Kline and 1st Lt. Edward W. Cordes, the latter flying a plane from the 8th Sqdn, made a total of three (3) sorties over Formosa. The Formosa missions were something of a feeler to gain more lucrative targets for the 3rd Group. For these missions two 75 gallon wing tanks - one as a fire bomb, and the other as an extra load of gasoline for the purpose of boosting the A-20's range.

6. Miscellaneous

a. In instances where the terrain was such that a plane could not fly lower than 100 feet over the target to drop its bombs, aerial bursts often resulted. Since aerial bursts are ineffective against cave positions and pill boxes, it became necessary to drop the bombs free falling, in such cases, by releasing the parachute cables.

b. The four (4) to five (5) second delay fuse has been favored by pilots, since the early days of skip bombing. However, for reasons which have not been explained, a mixed load of four (4) - five (5) second delay fuse in the bomb bay and eight (8) - fifteen (15) delay on the wings has carried since January 1945; lately all fuses have been eight (8) - fifteen (15) second delay. The squadron has voiced its disapproval, because such a long delay necessitates longer intervals between the striking

planes and fails to give the close protection of the bomb blast to the retreating planes.

c. Experiments are being conducted on the use of 1000 # parademos for future use. If used successfully, all credit for the orainstorm goes to Lt. Alden, our armament Officer.

3. Major Samuel M. Frederick, formerly Operations Officer of the 13th Bombardment Squadron, assumed command on the 30th of the month relieving Major Stanley D. Kline who became 3rd Bombardment Group Operations Officer. T/Sgt. Stephen J. Heritik was transferred from 3rd Bombardment Group Headquarters and became assistant to the Sergeant Major. S/Sgt. - 3. During the month of April Engineering personnel changed a total of sixteen aircraft engines. It is believed this number over a 30 day period is unsurpassed in the history of the Squadron. Due to extreme dusty conditions encountered at Elmore strip, engine cylinders, piston and rings were worn resulting in excessive oil consumption. An inspection of propellers disclosed nine with severe cracks and nicks, all of which had to be changed. This propeller damage was the result of rocks and gravel picked up from taxiweys and revetments by prop rotation.
- 4. Airplane inspections included seven 50-hour and five 100-hour inspections, all of which were made in conjunction with the engine change.
- 5. A total of ten airplanes were grounded from four to twenty-two consecutive days. The maintenance record for the month was 55.6 per cent in commission, 30.7 per cent airplane grounded awaiting parts and 13.6 per cent for maintenance.
- 6. One new aircraft A-20H-10DO was received during the month. One aircraft type A-20G-45DO was lost over the target.
- 7. On the 7th of April the line section was moved from Elmore strip to McGuire strip because of approaching rainy season. This was accomplished over a period of two weeks because seven airplanes were left at Elmore strip awaiting engine change.
- $\mathbf{8}_{\bullet}$ Two airplanes were transferred to the Service Squadron for change of main landing gear strut.
 - 9. Total flying time of aircraft for the month was 486:45 hours.
- 10. The parachute department was inspected by squadron, group and bomber command inspectors and found satisfactory. Some parachutes have been damaged by rats but improvised traps has dispelled this danger.
- ll. The maintenance section at present is endeavoring to mobilize all shop machinery with the use of trailers. Salvaged airplane wheels and tires were used to replace small iron wheels on the "A" frame thus making it easier to move.
- 12. During the month Technical Supply department completed a 24-hour move from Elmore strip to McGuire strip. Sixteen engines and nine propellers were drawn for grounded aircraft and numerous other minor items. A complete stock and equipment inventory was initiated and completed and requisitions are in process for shortages. From a minimum of eight airplanes grounded at one time during the month; the month was finished with no airplanes grounded for parts and all were on the alert status.

 - 4. The Ordnance section is authorized by the Table of Organization eighteen men. We have only twelve assigned. One man does the clerical work, one is the small arms man, two cannot lift because of weak backs and the squadron draws one man each day for detail. Therefore a total of seven men made the above deliveries which is highly commendable.
 - a. Lt. Alder joined the organization 5 April, 1945 and was made ordnance officer as an additional duty.
 - b. 3/Sgt. Studley returned from furlough to the States.
 - c. Ffc. Bogard was promoted to Cpl.
 - 5. It seems to be a squadron policy if the section is not up to strength to distribute the rank to other departments on the basis that a unit that small should not have all the authorized rank, but should be pro-rated. The position vacancy is nevertheless there and some one is holding down the jobs calling for the rank. In fact because of the additional work due to shortage of man power they deserve it even more than normal. For better moral and efficiency the Table of Organization should be adhered to more closely.

- 6. Operations were further hampered the past month because parts for the trailers are unobtainable and two trailers are not servicable. Preventative maintenance is not up to par because of the shortage of men. This problem is being worked out with the help of the Motor Fool.
- 7. Ffc. Edward Fulton has been doing a very admirable job in the small arms section. he goes over the guns on a fifty hour inspection. The efficiency gained by this preventative maintenance is very noticeable.
- 8. Considerable instruction and demonstration has been given to the men in order to comply with directives of Fifth Air Force Ordnance. It is believed this has materially reduced the amount of duds from this organization.
- 9. A shortage of parachutes developed at this base. Sgt. Jeter and the men found a large pile still attached to fragmentation bombs. Many of them were not servicable but almost 200 servicable ones had been found when a Ordnance Officer at the dump told them they were "no good" and not to mess the pile up. This was perhaps the most humorous incident of the month.

Inspections showed few mistakes this past month. Safety wire was broken on one command transmitter in one of the ships. Pilots are briefed regularly on operation of all the radio equipment, yet "Gock-pit/Trouble" seems to be one problem you can't get away from. Infrequently towers report planes with emergency IFF on. Inspections prove their diagnosis incorrect. The main fault seems to lie in the fact that dirty dynamotor brushes, will give a "squitter" somewhat similar to an emergency signal.

The squadron has been looking forward to a PA system for some time. We finally received a PA-6, Signal Corps issue. Outside the scope of its military business use, it is surprising what such equipment will do for the morals. Reading the news and playing music during mealtimes, seems to offer the men much needed relaxation.



aTR: Three close support missions were flown in the Dulac (07.6-91.8) area at 0900, 0930 and 1000. Each flight consisted of nine A-20s carrying 6 x 250 lb parademos and 2 tanks of napalm each. Ground observer who moved into the area at the end of the strikes observed that the results were excellent. 75% of Dulac was leveled. Under the buildings had been Jap emplacements. Approximately 15 trucks were found destroyed by the bombs and napalm. In addition, at least one 20 MM gun and one 70 MM howitzer were also destroyed. Other advantages of the napalm to the infantry was: it burned off camouflags from emplacements; the area which has been mined heavily with ombs and booby trapped extensively was cleared by the strike; the napalm made the trauches and holes untenable for the Japs and the evaluated Jap casualties from the strike cannot definitely be ascertained because only pieces of charred bodies were found in the target area.
