REPORT OF CONVOY

PILOT: Lieutenant Messick.

- 1. Attached hereto is a sketch-map of convoy, as seen by pilot at time of attack.
 - 2. Date: March 3, 1943.
 Location: Approximately 0710S-14750E.
 Time: 1000/L.
- 3. Attack made on AP No. 1 travelling 80° course, 8-10,000 tons, speed undetermined. Attack made amidship from course of 360° at an estimated air-speed of 260 miles per hour. No. A/A observed from attacked ship.
- 4. The altitude of attack, between mast height and deck-level. Both bombs drapped simultaneously. AP strafed on route to start bombing run. One bomb-hit observed. No particular evasive action of enemy AA used.
 - 5. Nil enemy A/C were observed.
 - 6. Nil enemy A/C tactics were observed.
- 7. 150 x .50 350 x .30 calibre ammunition expended in one strafing attack on AP No. 1. 2 x 500 # demolition bombs (1-4 to 5 sec. delay, tailfused, nil nose fused, and 1-8 to 11 sec. delay tail-fused, nil nose-fused.)
 - 8. Observations: One bomb-hit on AP No. 1, later seen to explode.

 Hit by B-25 skip-bombing on DD No. 2.

 DD No. 3 standing s till.

 AP No. 4 observed to be burning.

 Beaufighters observed strafing ships throughout the convoy.

 Warships protecting convoy observed to be on constant patrol on outer edges, circling the convoyed merchantmen and transports.
 - 9. Nil enemy A/C observed.
- 10. No comment on tactics employed in attack on convoy, other than those which we followed had proved successful.
